# Message of The Sangha Supreme Council of Thailand

Dear Members of the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation,

It is an honour to come together for the WBDO Conference in 2023 and share in the mission of disseminating the teachings of Buddhism and promoting the cultivation of knowledge and wisdom.

As we embark on this mission, let us remember the teachings of the compassionate Lord Buddha, who bestowed upon us the noble heritage of a mission to disseminate the teachings of Buddhism, emphasising the essence of knowledge (vijja) and wisdom (panya), which are the principal tasks of Buddhist missionaries. The dissemination of knowledge (vijja) and wisdom (panya) is inseparable during missions abroad and should not be devoid of mindfulness (sati), which serves as a reminder to incorporate knowledge (vijja) and wisdom (panya). The deficiency of mindful dissemination can lead to detrimental results rather than benefit. Lack of mindfulness when implementing knowledge (vijja) and wisdom (panya) can be misused for destructive purposes, which can cause trouble for oneself, society, and even Buddhism as a whole.

To prevent this, the great teacher Lord Buddha compassionately taught the importance of training in clear and right mindfulness (sammasati), which frees us from the mindlessness state (micchasati). Cultivating clear and correct mindfulness will develop into 'appamadadhamma,' meaning a state of non-heedlessness that can help the arising of wisdom (panya).

Lord Buddha also laid down the five principles for the peaceful propagation of Buddhism, including the procession of moral practice (sila sampada), the procession of views (dassana-sampada), righteousness (dhammatthata), righteous speech (saccavadita), and dutifulness (attano-kammakuppata).

It is essential that the purpose of the WBDO is not driven by personal gain or hidden agendas but rather by the desire to serve the greater good and promote the well-being of all beings. As we collaborate for our own and others' well-being, let



us remember the noble cause we are dedicated to and work together to bring peace and harmony to people from all walks of life.

As a member of The Sangha Supreme Council of Thailand, I have had the privilege of witnessing first-

hand the transformative power of Buddhism and its ability to bring peace and harmony to people from all walks of life. I am proud to be associated with an organisation dedicated to this noble cause.

May the power of the Triple Gem and all meritorious deeds protect the committee of the WBDO for their dedication in maintaining the Dhamma in all forms, as well as the Sangha, laypeople, supporters, and people who co-sponsored the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation Conference for the year 2023 (2566 BE).

In May 2018, we gathered in Singapore to sign the Singapore Declaration. This urged the establishment of a centre for the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation (WBDO) in the United Kingdom, with a preference for London. Within one year, we established the WBDO with a centre in Plymouth and a website teaching the Dhamma online.

Thai Theravada Dhammaduta monks have come together to offer classes in various subjects such as courses for lay ministers of religion, Buddhist studies, and Tipitaka chanting. There are Dhamma talks by monks from four continents, and peace walks in Staffordshire and from Land's End to the WBDO Centre in Plymouth have been organised.

The members of the Sangha have helped to increase awareness of Buddhist culture, and monks have participated in alms rounds by walking door-to-door in Staffordshire and other areas such as London, Windsor, Birmingham, and Wolverhampton.

We aim to create friends in Dhamma, and this missionary work has been an integral part of the life of Buddhist monks since the time of the Buddha. We look forward to hearing from other temples all over the world about how they are reaching out to the lay community in their area and what work they do to promote Buddhism for the happiness of mankind.

Some decades ago, Western Buddhists expressed hope that Buddhist monks would be seen engaging more in good works in their lay communities. We hope that good will come from our present activities, which can do no harm to anyone.

We urge our monks around the world to practice the Dhamma actively, set a positive example through their monastic lifestyle, respect the laws of the countries in which they reside, and increase the overall happiness of their local communities.

# Message of Chief Editor



Dear readers and my friends in Dhamma

It is my great pleasure to present to you this publication, which marks the first conference of the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation (WBDO). The conference will be held from 12 May to 14 May 2023 in Singapore on the auspicious occasion of the 94-year-old celebration of Most Venerable Phratep Siddhivides, abbot of Wat Ananda Metyarama Thai Buddhist Temple.

The WBDO, founded in 2018, unites Buddhist missionaries from around the world to further the teachings of Buddhism and to encourage understanding and cooperation between different sects and religions. It envisions: "We will unite to stabilise, strengthen, and sustain the progress of Buddhism. We will come together to establish the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation to promote and preserve the teachings of the Lord Buddha." Its goals include, notably, the following: unifying the overseas Buddhist Dhammaduta missionary organisations worldwide; promoting education in and practice of Vipassana meditation; and furthering mutual understanding and building good relationships with other religions, faiths, and beliefs.

From the past to now, the Thai overseas Dhammaduta Bhikkhus have travelled abroad to propagate Buddhism based on the Thai cultural identity and characteristics. In Singapore, the Thai Dhammaduta Bhikkhus have spread Lord Buddha's teachings to both Thais and Singaporeans. For a century, Wat Ananda Metyarama Thai Buddhist Temple has remained the centre for Buddhist propagation, proving the strength and sustainability of Buddhism. Most Venerable Chao Khun Phratep Siddhivides is the current chief abbot of Wat Ananda Metyarama Thai Buddhist Temple and the leader of the Thai Sangha Samatca in Singapore.

On the auspicious occasion of the Singapore Declaration, 2018 (BE 2561), the Dhammaduta groups from the four continents jointly signed a declaration to continue the propagation of Buddhism. There were seven founding members: the Thai Sangha Samatca (Singapore), The Council of Thai Buddhist Monks of the United Kingdom

and Ireland, The Council of Thai Bhikkhus in the U.S.A., The Union of Thai Sanghas in Oceania, the Malaysian Siamese Buddhist Monk Organisation, the Dhammaduta Bhikkhus Thai Mission in India-Nepal, and The Union of Thai Sanghas in Europe.

Subsequently, on 17 November 2018 (BE 2561), the founding committee held a meeting to follow up on progress as well as to define the direction and create an action plan for the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation. The bylaws were unanimously adopted on 12 May 2021 at the 1st Annual General Meeting of 2021 (No. 1/2021). The official bylaws stated the authority and duty of the Board of Directors and Executive Committee of the WBDO. The general meeting also announced the appointment of several subcommittees and summarised the past two-year work and future project planning.

This publication, WBDO Conference 2023, then, contains information about the WBDO and its objectives, as well as articles and reflective messages from members and leaders of the organisation. Included in the book are, in the main, the founding story and the establishment of the WBDO, rules and regulations, and past activities. Rules and regulations include the following: general, e.g., the objectives (goals) of the organisation; administration, e.g., the make-up of the Board of Trustees, and the missions that divide up the work of the WBDO; powers and duties, e.g., the powers and duties of the Steering Committee, the President, and the Secretary-General; member, e.g., the types of members; finance and property, e.g., sources of money and property for the organisation; and meetings, e.g., the tweeto steering the book portrays past events of the WBDO, including two online Tipitaka recitations.

I would like to express my sincere gratitude to all the contributors to this publication, as well as to the members and leaders of the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation for their dedication and commitment to promoting the teachings of Buddhism. I hope that this book will inspire and inform readers, and that it will help to build a stronger and more cohesive community of Buddhist practitioners around the world. I hope that it will serve as a valuable resource for those interested in learning more about the WBDO and its work.


We hope this conference will provide enriching and enlightening experiences for all attendees and prove valuable for all participants.

Dhammaduta work is an important means of spreading the word of Buddhism. The tradition of spreading the teachings began with Lord Buddha, who sent disciples to other countries from the first year of his Enlightenment. Today, it is done systematically by monks who act as ambassadors of Dhamma.

The Council of Thai Monks in the UK is very heartened by the persistent efforts of monks worldwide in missionary work for Buddhism and the ongoing progress in this area. The Sangha's focus on gaining knowledge and understanding of Buddhism allows for its practical application and teaching. It is commendable when a novice, who has studied from a young age, becomes a self-sufficient monk and dedicates himself to spreading the teachings of the Buddha.

In the past, the emphasis on teaching Dhamma was less significant. However, Mahachulalongkorn University, which most monks graduated from, began providing training on a case-by-case basis to those interested in spreading Buddhism and communicating their knowledge abroad. Many monks accepted this challenge and went on to teach in other countries.



The training process for spreading Buddhism has progressed over 30 years. It has been determined that monks living outside of Thailand should adopt a system of governance to work effectively together. Coordinating with monks worldwide is essential for missions abroad, and international standards are hoped to be established through cooperation with foreign monks.

Language learning is crucial for monks who are missionaries outside of Thailand and want to align with Thai Sangha policies. Common standards can be adopted to advance Buddhism within Thailand and globally through the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation.

The Council of Thai Monks in the UK, associated with the Thai Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation, is pleased with the growth of the missionary monk movement worldwide.

We send our greetings to this First Annual Conference and meeting and urge all Buddhist missionaries to unite and work together for the greater good, advancing the Dhamma Chakra of the Buddha.

Thai temples also serve as a venue for activities and events on important occasions, such as 'Songkran' or







• Set up a foreign language centre to teach languages to Overseas Dhammaduta Bhikkhus.

• Conduct personnel training and development programmes to enhance Dhammaduta Bhikkhus' performance.

• Set up administration and welfare benefit funds for the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation.

• Assist and support the teaching of the Thai language and culture abroad.

• Set up the Information Technology Centre for Overseas Dhammaduta Bhikkhus teams.

• Provide donations and support to local communities.

• Create organisational development and action plans that are consistent with the policies of the public and Sangha sectors.

By implementing these actions, the WBDO aims to promote the flourishing of Buddhism, bringing peace and happiness to humanity. *"May Buddhism flourish through time!"*

Phra Rajawithetpanyakhun (Dr Laow Panyasiri), the Chairman of the Founding Committee, is the authorised signatory under the bylaws. Following the organisation's regulations, he has the authority to issue announcement letters to select and appoint additional signatories from committee members such as the Chairman and Vice-Chairmans.

The appointed officers can be selected from any continent around the world.

The board Chairman is assigned to open the organisation's bank account to allow the issuance of charitable donation receipts as proof of donation. The treasurer must co-sign any bank-related documents with the Chairman. Executive members have the authority to disburse funds. The credit card can be used only as directed by the meeting resolution.

The meeting adopted the bylaws unanimously on 12 May 2021 at the 1st Annual General Meeting of 2021 (No. 1/2021). The official bylaws stated the authority and duty of the Board of Directors and Executive Committee of the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation. The general meeting also announced the appointment of several subcommittees and summarised the past two-year work and future project planning.

In accordance with the Singapore Declaration, the Secretariat Office of the Dhammaduta Councils across the four continents was established through a joint meeting of Dhammaduta Bhikkhus from each region. # Roles & Responsibilities



The roles and responsibilities of Dhammaduta Bhikkhus performing religious activities around the world can be categorised into four types of activities as follows:

#### 1. Propagation:

The activities consist of the preservation, promotion and protection of Buddhism and Buddhist teachings. The temples organise events and activities and merit-making ceremonies on important Buddhist days such as Magha Puja Day, Visakha Puja Day, Asalha Puja Day, the Candle Festival for Buddhist Lent, Tak Bat Devo (food offering to the monks) at the end of Buddhist Lent, and the Kathina ceremony.

Moreover, for the promotion of Thai culture in foreign countries, temples organise these major events such as Songkran Day, the Loi Krathong festival, and merit-making on New Year's Day, including the Thai rites and rituals of birth and marriage ceremonies, and funeral and anniversary services.

#### 2. Education:

Two types of educational activities, Buddhist studies and Thai culture, are offered in all temples.

Buddhist studies, Pali and Dhamma classes include Buddhist Sunday School and short-term Buddhist meditation retreats.

Apart from general Buddhist studies, there are Dhamma studies and Pali studies programmes in accordance with the requirements of the Thai Sangha Council of Thailand. These are taught in various temples for Thai people and interested people, including at Buddhist Sunday School and during Summer Temporary Ordination, etc.

Thai cultural education such as Thai language classes are widely taught in almost all temples. In addition, Thai culture dance, Traditional Thai massage and traditional Thai food trainings are also organised to educate and promote Thai culture.

#### 3. Facility Management and Maintenance:

This includes organising and facilitating training programmes on monastic rules and regulations, essential domestic law and legal requirements regarding the establishment of temples, and the construction and repair of buildings to avoid possible problems.

Organising seminars and trainings to improve temples as a place of worship and sanctuary for local Buddhist communities and interested people. Also, training programmes to provide education and knowledge about the host countries and cultures, including strategies to work with other local faith groups.

#### 4. Community Support:

The temples support the local and international communities by providing basic needs, humanitarian support, and encouraging social work, such as financial support, food distribution and essential supplies for emergency and disaster relief, such as providing clinics with free essential medicines and first aid supplies, etc.

# ••• Rules & Regulations



The establishment of the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation is a significant and important task in creating unity and understanding among Dhammaduta Bhikkhus of all continents, promoting the practice of Dhamma with harmony, dignity, and mutual respect, and spreading the teachings of Buddhism for the benefit of all humanity, promoting peace and happiness, and preserving the teachings of the Buddha for the continuation of Buddhism. Therefore, regulations have been established as follows:



#### General

1. The title of this organisation is "The World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation" and it is a non-profit organisation not involved in politics.

2. These regulations come into force from 12 May 2021 onwards.

3. Any other regulations previous to or inconsistent with these regulations in various sections are repealed.

4. The Chairman of the board, elected at the general meeting, is responsible for maintaining compliance with these regulations.

5. The organisation's title in English is the "World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation."

6. The World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation's abbreviated name in Thai is "อพล," and its abbreviated name in English is "WBDO."

7. The organisation has a seal that serves as its emblem logo, which consists of the Wheel of the Doctrine (Dhammacakka) layered over the world map, representing the global expansion of Buddhism. The text in English above reads "World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation," and below displays the English abbreviation "WBDO" on an amber background.

8. In these regulations, "World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation" means an organisation registered under the law of England.

The "Board of Directors" means the highest executive committee of the organisation.

9. The World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation has the following objectives:

9.1. To unify overseas Buddhist Dhammaduta Bhikkhus or Buddhist missionary organisations worldwide.

9.2. To codify uniform policies and guidelines in the teaching of Buddhism.

9.3. To build a network and cooperative global network of overseas dhammaduta organisations.

9.4. To promote the education and practice of Vipassana for the benefit of humankind.

9.5. To build relationships and work with other Buddhist denominations.

9.6. To promote mutual understanding and build good relationships with other religions, faiths, and beliefs.

9.7. To represent all overseas dhammaduta organisations on the international stage.

9.8. To act as a non-political and non-profit religious organisation.





### **Administration**

10. The Board of Directors of the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation:

The Board of Directors of the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation is a group of Dhammaduta Bhikkhus who are elected at the annual general meeting to manage the organisation's operations according to its policies and objectives. The board members serve for a term of three (3) years. The details are as follows:

- 10.1 The Board of Directors of the WBDO consists of:
- a) Chairman of the Board 1 monk
- b) Vice-Chairman 8 monks
- c) Secretary-General 1 monk
- d) Deputy Secretary-General 3 monks
- e) Treasurer 2 monks/laypeople
- f) Assistant Treasurer 3 monks/laypeople
- g) Members 9 monks/laypeople

The total number of board members is 27 monks/laypeople and should not be less than 20 monks/laypeople. Either members or nonmembers can fill the position of assistant treasurer.

10.2 When a director position becomes vacant, the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation Board of Directors will consider appointing a new director to fill the vacancy. The person appointed to the vacant position will serve for the remainder of the term of the person they are replacing.

11. A secretary's office is a unit of the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation Board of Directors and is responsible for overseeing meetings, publications, registration, legal affairs, finance, and coordination with other organisations as assigned by the Chairman. The Secretary's Office is located at the temple affiliated with the Secretary. 12. The administration of the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation is divided into different departments, namely administration, mission, education, public utilities, public relations, fundraising, etc. These departments may be divided into offices, divisions, or centres, or other agencies can be added as needed.

13. The Board of Directors Committee of the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation invites monks or laypeople to apply for appointment to the Board of Advisors and patrons. The term of office for advisors and patrons is the same as that of the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation Board of Directors.

14. The methods of election, qualifications, other responsibilities, and termination of the Board of Directors will be officially announced by the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation.





## Powers and duties of the Board of Directors of the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation.

15. The powers and duties of the board members are:

15.1. To carry out the administration of the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation in accordance with its policies and objectives.

15.2. To provide support, maintain and develop members of the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation.

15.3. To appoint or assign committee members, sub-committees, or working groups to assist the work of the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation.

15.4. To issue rules, announcements, or any other regulations for the benefit of the administration of the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation.

16. The powers and duties of the Chairman are:

16.1. To preside over the meetings of the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation and the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation's Annual General Meeting.

16.2. To act as the administrative Chair.

16.3. To be responsible for the general administration of the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation.

16.4. To represent the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation in all matters.

17. The powers and duties of the Vice-Chairman are:

17.1. To assist the Chairman of the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation.

17.2. To act as an executive in various fields as assigned by the Chairman.

17.3. To act as chairman in various departments as assigned by the Chairman.

17.4. In the absence of the Chairman or his inability to attend, to represent the Chairman as assigned by the Chairman.

18. The powers and duties of the Secretary-General are:

18.1. To head the Secretary's Office.

18.2. To act as Secretary at meetings of the Board of Directors.

18.3. To act as Secretary of the Board of Directors' Executive Committee.

18.4. To perform duties as assigned by the Chairman or Vice-Chairman of the WBDO. In the absence or inability to attend of the Secretary-General, the Chairman may assign one of the Deputy Secretaries-General to perform his duties.

19. The duties and responsibilities of the Deputy Secretary-General are:

19.1. To assist the Secretary-General at meetings.

19.2. To act as secretary of various committees, as assigned by the Chairman.

19.3. In the absence of a Deputy Secretary-General or his inability to perform his duties, the Chairman or Vice-Chairman may assign another Deputy Secretary-General to perform his duties.

20. Members of the Board of Directors may be members of the committee of different departments and represent the WBDO or as assigned by the chairman.

21. The Treasurer and Assistant Treasurer have the authority to supervise the application of the financial statutes and assets and perform duties as approved by the WBDO committee or the Chairman of the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation.



22. There are three types of members of the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation:

- a. Honorary
- b. Monastic
- c. Lay

Annual membership subscriptions of the WBDO for an organisation, individual dhammaduta monk, or a monk who is volunteering in an oversea temple are:

- 1. Annual subscription for an individual £10.00
- 2. Lifetime membership £100.00
- 3. Annual subscription for an organisation £50.00

23. Members of the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation have a duty to support and assist the work of the monks worldwide.

For information on classes of membership, as well as on the rights and responsibilities of all membership classes, please refer to the official announcement of the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation.

# Section 5

### **Finance and Assets**

24. The funding and assets of the World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation are obtained from:

- a) Organisational membership fees
- b) Generous donations from devotees
- c) Miscellaneous funding
- d) Funding from the private and public sectors
- e) Other

25. Management of the finance and assets of the WBDO shall be in accordance with the official announcement of the WBDO.

26. The Board of Directors of the WBDO will appoint an annual auditor.



### **Meetings**

27. WBDO meetings are divided into three categories:

- (1) an annual general meeting
- (2) an extraordinary/emergency meeting
- (3) an organisation management committee meeting

27.1 The annual general meeting shall be held once a year.

27.2 The annual general meeting shall determine the venue for the following year's annual general meeting, with approval from all committees.

27.3 An extraordinary/emergency meeting may be held in addition to the ordinary annual meeting in case of the need for urgent consideration or when the Chairman or at least half of the members sign and present a request to the Chairman. The World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation may hold an extraordinary/emergency meeting in person or online, as deemed appropriate.

27.4 The venue for an extraordinary/emergency meeting shall be determined by the annual general meeting or the Chairman of the organisation, depending on the circumstances.

27.5 Resolutions of the meeting shall be passed by a majority of votes. In case of a tie, the presiding chairman of the meeting shall have a deciding vote.

28. A meeting of the Board of Directors of the WBDO must be attended by at least half of the members of the Board in order to form a quorum and there must be at least three (3) meetings in a year.

29. The guidelines and detailed information regarding any meetings shall be as announced by the WBDO.



## **Amendment of Regulations**

30. Amendments to these rules and regulations may be made with the approval of two-thirds of the members of the Board of Directors.

31. The interpretation of these rules and regulations shall be based on a resolution of the Board of Directors of the organisation. The World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation's interpretation shall be final.



32. In the event that the WBDO is unable to continue and must be dissolved, all assets will be given exclusively to Buddhist charitable organisations.



33. The Board of Directors of the WBDO, who were elected or committee members who were appointed prior to these rules and regulations shall continue to act in accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the WBDO until the end of their term.

34. These rules and regulations of the WBDO are established in accordance with the requirements for the organisation officially registered in England on 11 November 2019.





# Past Online Activities

The World Buddhist Dhammaduta Organisation has been active in promoting Buddhism, even in the face of challenges posed by the Covid-19 pandemic. In 2020, the WBDO organised the first-ever online 'Worldwide Tipitaka Chanting' across four continents, attracting Buddhists from around the world. The WBDO offered an online Lay minister Training Programme and conducted various activities, such as meditation and Dhamma discussion classes, technology and media training for Dhammaduta Bhikkhus, English Language classes and special events like Magha Puja Day, Visakha Puja Day, and Asalha Puja Day.



In September 2021, the WBDO continued the online activities with the 2nd online Worldwide Tipitaka Chanting for peace, which was divided into four zones: the U.S.A., the European, the Oceanian, and the Asian. The U.S.A zone was organised by The Council of the Thai Bhikkhus in the U.S.A., while the European zone was made up of The Union of Thai Sanghas in Europe and The Council of Thai Buddhist Monks of the United Kingdom and Ireland. The Oceania zone featured The Union of Thai Sanghas in Oceania, including Australia and New Zealand, and the Asian zone included regional Dhammaduta organisations like the Thai Sangha Samatca (Singapore) and the Malaysian Siamese Buddhist Monk Organisation.





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
















# ntroduction to the WBDO Conference 2023
